Mr. Quint spent four years working for DNA-Peoples' Legal Services, Inc. as a Managing Attorney at the Hopi/Keams Canyon and Tuba City Offices, providing legal services and representation to low-income and vulnerable populations. He is licensed to practice law in Arizona, the Navajo Nation, and in the Hopi Tribal Courts.

Originally from southwest Michigan, Brian obtained his Juris Doctor from the Michigan State University College of Law, and his Bachelor of Arts degree in International Relations from Michigan State University. While a student there, he participated in the Indigenous Law and Policy Center and focused his studies on Federal Indian Law.

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Founded in 1984 and located on Capitol Hill in Washington, DC, the Navajo Nation Washington Office (NNWO) serves as the Navajo Nation's advocate with Congress, the White House and Federal Agencies. The NNWO monitors and analyzes congressional legislation, disseminates congressional and federal agencies' information, develops strategies and decisions concerning national policies and budgets that affect the Navajo Nation.
