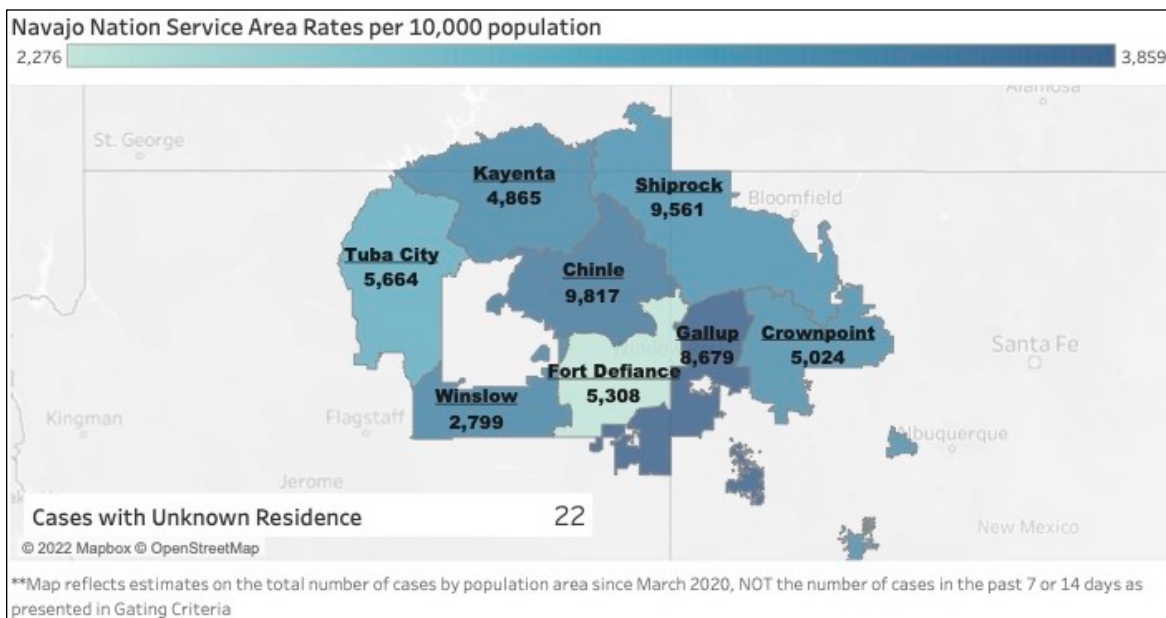

49 new cases, 49,307 recoveries, and no deaths related to COVID-19



WINDOW ROCK, Ariz. – On Sunday, the Navajo Department of Health, in coordination with the Navajo Epidemiology Center and the Navajo Area Indian Health Service, reported 49 new COVID-19 cases for the Navajo Nation and no deaths. The total number of deaths remains 1,636. The report indicates that 49,307 individuals have recovered from COVID-19. 486,474 COVID-19 tests have been administered. The overall total number of positive COVID-19 cases is now 51,739, including eight delayed reported cases.

* 22 residences with COVID-19 positive cases are not specific enough to place them accurately in a Service Unit.

On Sunday, the state of Arizona reported 4,397 new cases. The states of Utah and New Mexico will report weekend case numbers on Monday.

“Through the commitment of our frontline warriors, there are plenty of opportunities to get the COVID-19 vaccines and booster shots, even on weekends. We have many of our frontline workers who sacrifice time with their families, to administer vaccines seven days a week. So, please get vaccinated to protect yourself against this modern-day monster known as COVID-19. “Through our faith in prayer and the support of our loved ones, we will get through this pandemic together. We have many health care workers and first responders fighting for us each and every day, so please do your part to remain safe and healthy. Please be safe and continue to pray for our people and our communities,” said Vice President Myron Lizer.
