the apprehension they felt on their first day of college and how they overcame it

"Don't set yourself up for failure by trying to make everything perfect," the President said. "It's going to be a tough road. So continue to know there's always room for improvement." First Lady Blackwater-Nygren told the

students what it felt like to be a first-generation college student from Kayenta, Ariz., attending Stanford University.

"I remember feeling isolated and feeling alone," she said.

The President, who received his bachelor's degree in Construction Management and an MBA from Arizona State The Navajo leaders' presentation aimed to promote diversity and inclusion on campus.

Their message was of strength, empowerment and community.

Despite what they may being feeling being away from home for the first time, First Lady Nygren assured the students of hers, the President's and the Navajo Nation's support for them.

"My husband and I – and the Navajo Nation – we believe in you, we support you," First Lady Blackwater-Nygren said.

President Nygren said as a student education was important to him because it meant the difference between uncertainty after high school and unlimited opportunity and independence.

He told the students that they represented the community of Indigenous students on college campuses everywhere.

Embrace the opportunity to learn about as many diverse cultures and backgrounds as they could, he said.

Make the most of the time you have at Utah State through the pursuit of knowledge, expansion of your social circles, and by broadening their perspectives, he said.

The First Lady encouraged the freshmen to find support systems to help them succeed academically and socially.
